## Girls' names on Victorian gold and sterling silver

What a delightful find this small thematic topic is!

At first glance they may seem to have been engraved by a Victorian jeweller - using the old-world girls' and women's names?

No, no - these are the way the thimbles were made by the Victorian silversmiths, with the names in high relief. Thanks to Norma Spicer and Di Pelham Burn's excellent reference book *Registered designs on thimbles*, we even know who made some of these thimbles.

All the names are in uppercase, but you may notice that there is more than one thimble maker involved, with the variety of lettering.

In 1887, **D & Lionel Spiers** (DLS) of Birmingham registered (RD 75400) their design of girls' names on plainly indented thimbles with large Old English Text lettering with a stylised leaf patterning around the rest of the band: all lettered over fine striations.

DLS names encountered to date are for <u>Alice</u> - <u>Anne</u> - <u>Clara</u> - <u>Edith</u> (i) - <u>Jane</u> - <u>Maude</u>.

Kate - Lucy - Sarah bear the marks of **Lionel Spiers** (LS) and these carry the same RD number.

The thimbles with the all-over daisy patterning are made by a different maker. They contain the maker's marks for **Bent & Parker** (B&P) and they date from 1893, bearing the PP14988 numbering.

These names are for Edith (ii) - Maggie. They also made plain Polly thimbles in the same year.

Nellie with a similar daisy patterning, has a different maker's mark for HP, in 1899.

All these girls' names have slightly smaller lettering than the Spiers' thimbles but were still using Old English Text upper case.

James Fenton (JF) had Polly thimbles made from 1888 to 1905 with plain lettering.

There are even gold thimbles produced from the 1840s onwards with <u>Beatrice</u> – <u>Elizabeth</u> – <u>Harriett</u> - these were probably made in SMALL numbers?

For completeness I have now included a rare example with <u>Elisabeth</u> made by one of the German thimble silversmiths and French girls' name thimbles with <u>Marie</u> – <u>Pauline</u> by **Justin Levy Alekan**.

There is also an American thimble with Daisy from **Goldsmith-Stern**.
