# Charles Iles *The* ... thimbles and boxes Birmingham England

I have been interested in Charles Iles of Birmingham's base metal thimbles and none more so, than the named ones that include the initial word "*The*".

I can't think of any other thimble maker who named a selection of his thimbles in this manner. All, except one or two of these thimbles, are lettered in cursive.

The most famous of these Iles thimbles, commanding high prices, is "*The Dorothy*". Originally it was included as one of the "Five D..." thimbles, which included **D**orcas, **D**reema, **D**ura and **D**oris, as they all had the same beginning letter. *The Dorothy* is not a steel-cored sterling silver thimble and this grouping of the five named thimbles together may lead to the wrong impression of what it is made of.

"The Dorothy" is only silver-cased.

This is a term used by Charles Iles in his marketing of his merchandise.

Other Iles "The" thimbles are also silver-cased or made of nickel silver.

According to Norma Spicer in her book on Charles Iles, "*The Dorothy*" thimble was named after his daughter Dorothy Iles, who was born in 1882.

Most of the examples do not have the Charles Iles maker's mark, but a few do.

3 thimbles with touching rims in a triangular shield, was registered in 1876 this mark is often confused with and described as the Chester assay mark of three sheaves

What did the other 'The' terms/names stand for?


The fact that the little named Iles cardboard thimble boxes have survived makes them quite special and precious – they are fragile and have survived into the 21<sup>st</sup> century. Treasure them! Some of the thimble boxes have a number on the front of the box? Does this conform to the size of the thimble or the number of the design?

in her chapter on Charles Horner thimbles, Spicer states "... which **may** be a Horner production but could also be an example of a **competitor** ..."

Why couldn't this competitor be Charles Iles?

there are no maker's marks on these thimbles


Di Pelham Burn listed THE "DORCOID" thimble in her booklet on steel-cored thimbles, but ascribes it more to Charles Horner




THE DOROTHY

initially in the 1980s The Dorothy thimbles appeared in the thimble literature only named Dorothy Was this because it was difficult to show both words in one photo?

These haberdashers' counter display cases name them as DOROTHY and THE DOROTHY thimbles note that each thimble sold for 2/6

according to Thimble Society of London this thimble was made to commemorate Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee in 1897 Iles registered his "*The Queens Record Thimble*" display case for shop counters as RD 291339 on 2 January 1897, the year of the diamond jubilee


# OTHER CHARLES ILES "*THE* ..." THIMBLE BOXES or HOLDERS

according to Spicer "Obviously box making whether for counter display or for individual sale was of great importance to the Iles Company – in the early days they had their own box making department, but in later years it was contracted out to another company"

there is a different mark on the end of the heel on this navy blue plush slipper it's easier to read the lettering having a white background

> Iles' C TRADE MARK on end of the sole R<sup>D</sup> No. 128040 for this thimble holder MADE IN ENGLAND SILVER CASED THIMBLE



What a find! Iles obviously couldn't resist making boxes for every type of thimble – here's the box for The Fairy Slipper – and it's in a beautiful blue plush someone has really cared for this treasure with all three items being in such wonderful condition it would now be nearly 120-130 years old
