

Blackberry designs on sterling silver thimbles

This is my first thematic topic where the distinctive design around the thimble is the topic under discussion

Isbister illustrates the botanical blackberry images that these thimbles were based on. Many of the spiky leaves are well depicted on most of the thimbles



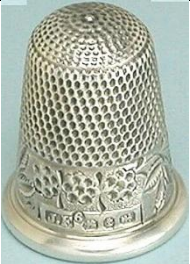
We are looking at these thimbles from more than one hundred years ago. The makers may not have seen some of these designs as blackberries, especially the single rows of berries in the Charles May thimbles

Isbister arranged the blackberry designs in his dissertation in the order of the different designs, with his descriptions

I debated for a while on how to arrange these thimbles. I have chosen to arrange them by the makers' marks. These may or may not be those of the thimble maker, just the marks used for the sponsor who commissioned the thimbles.

It is this order by Isbister that I have used to arrange the thimbles within each maker
The numbering in red is my own to facilitate referencing the entries below

The designs are:

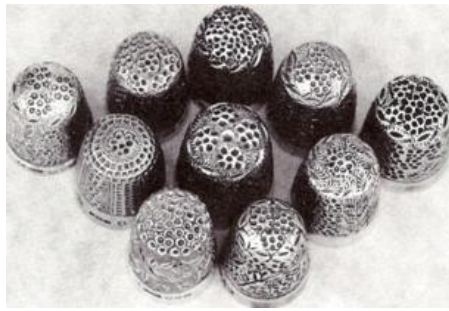
Pelham Burn mentions 25 different designs

These are two images from the Henry Griffith catalogue and they named their blackberry designs **fern** and **may**. They feature in the literature on blackberry thimbles



Scroll down to discover a non-British thimble with a blackberry design – I hope you're as delighted to see this

There are several different apexes to the blackberry thimbles. Many continue the design from the body of the thimble. Where thimbles have the berries featured in the band, the apex is plainly indented

You may choose to collect blackberry thimbles by maker (eg James Fenton, who had the most designs) – one from each maker – or the different variety blackberry designs thimbles. They have one of the most recognisable designs and are worth seeking out

Where they are available, I have shown all views of the all-round designs

The dates refer to the years the blackberry designs were made by each thimble maker

According to Isbister these thimbles are hand-engraved so there will not be two the same. The all over blackberry design is bright cut with a matt textured background with asymmetrical vines with leaves
